- The Cycle's Downward Spiral
- The Judges' Downward Spiral



- The Cycle
 - Safety > Enticed > Sin > Enslaved
 - Appeal > God heard/responded
 - Repented > God provided judge
 - Judge delivered > Freedom/Safety
 - Repeat



- The Cycle's Downward Spiral I
 - Israel repeatedly sinned
 - Israel repeatedly sought God's help
 - God always provided a deliverer



- The Cycle's Downward Spiral 2
 - 10.6 Israel's evil and "7 idols/gods"
 - 10.7 the LORD's anger was hot
 - 10.8 oppressed 18 years



- The Cycle's Downward Spiral 3
 - 10.9 Enemies invaded
 - 10.10 Israel cries out to God
 - 10.11-12 God recalls 7 deliveries



- The Cycle's Downward Spiral 4
 - 10.13 I will deliver you no more
 - 10.14 "go ... cry out to the gods"
 - 10.15 we sinned, do what's best, deliver us



- The Cycle's Downward Spiral 5
 - 10.16 Israel put away foreign gods
 - 10.17 God could no longer endure misery
 - 10.18 the people looked for a leader/judge



- The Cycle's Downward Spiral 6
 - concubines rape dismemberment
 - immorality vengeance jealousy
 - greed public/private idol worship
 - forsaking God forsaking God's word forsaking God's people



- The Judges' Downward Spiral
 - Ehud secretly plunged a dagger into Eglon
 - Gideon greed, ephod, harlotry, concubine, vengeance (destroys idol/creates new idol)
 - Abimelech vengeance (family/nation)
 - Jephthah Ephraimite slaughter, rash vow
 - Samson vengeance, repeated immorality



- More/General Downward Spiral
 - Danite idolatry Levite's concubine
 - Benjamin's sin Benjamin's near eradication
 - "In those days there was no king in Israel; everyone did what was right in his own eyes." (21.25, cf. 17.6)

- The Need For Jephthah
 - Judges 10 God's pledges help ... again
 - Judges 10 Israel sought a leader



- The Challenges of Jephthah I
 - 18 years of Israel's oppression
 - Israel's repeated idolatry
 - Israel: using up God's mercy
 - Israel was severely distressed (10.9)



- The Challenges of Jephthah 2
 - A harlot's son
 Brothers drove him out
 - No inheritance
 Jephthah fled
 - Jephthah's worthless raiders



- The Character of Jephthah I
 - Listened when elders called
 - Accepted leadership
 - Patient with Ammon's king
 - given "the Spirit of the LORD"



- The Character of Jephthah 2
 - Fought and defeated Ephraim
 - 42,000 Ephraimites were killed (cf. 8.1ff)
 - Made a rash vow
 - Fulfilled his vow



- Jephthah Sacrificed His Daughter I
 - Early interpreters' position (rabbinic/patristic)
 - Consistent linguistically (and/or debate; 2
 presuppositions/2 promises; Ephraim's egocentric
 perspective when he saw his daughter)
 - Consistent with Jephthah's character vengeance on Ephraim, rash vow, unnecessary vow



- Jephthah Sacrificed His Daughter 2
 - Compare Gideon & the Ephraimites (8.1ff) with Jephthah & the Ephraimites (11-12)
 - Consistent w/pagan influence on Gideon (idolatry), & w/pagan influence on Jephthah himself (human sacrifice) (cf. Manasseh)



- Jephthah Sacrificed His Daughter 3
 - Consistent w/Judges overall decline (Israel & her judges)
 - No real reason for the vow God had already made Jephthah a judge; God already promised him victory



- Jephthah Did Not Sacrifice His Daughter I
 - 2 months bewailing virginity if she lived she could do that the rest of her life
 - significance of childlessness vs. death in ancient cultures (cf. Sarah, Rebecca, Hannah, Elizabeth)



- Jephthah **Did Not Sacrifice** His Daughter 2
 - Spirit proves he did not sacrifice her (cf. David, King Saul, Gideon, Samson, I Cor. I 2ff, Peter)
 - Positive references in I Sam. I2.II & Heb. II.32 (Abraham, Noah, Gideon, Rahab are also there)
 - Jephthah was godly/knew biblical history (cf. above)



- Jephthah **Did Not Sacrifice** His Daughter 3
 - driven by "good" motives/desires
 - positive perspective defend God God's morality • God's revelation • God's people



Conclusion

- God Will Always Be Sovereign
 - Whether we are "good" or "evil"
 - Whether we get in the way
