





Both books address ...

- Judah and Israel
 - Record biblical history for their respective audiences
 - From the viewpoint of God's desires/expectations
 - Note the failure of both Judah and Israel to be faithful to God
 - Their respective falls into captivity
- Cover the same "basic" material

Kings/Chronicles · Similarities

Fully 50% of the material in Chronicles comes directly from Samuel/Kings





Both books address ...

- Questions ...
 - About the will of God
 - The promises/covenant of God
 - The role of Israel and Judah in God's plan (past present future)
 - The influence/impact of false "gods"

Kings/Chronicles · Similarities





Chronicles, however...

- Addresses a different audience …
 - Kings either still in exile or just returned from exile
 - Chronicles Israel deeper/further into the period of restoration
- Answers different questions …
 - Kings
 - Did God fail?
 No, God did not fail.

 - Is Marduk greater than Yahweh?
 No, God remains in control.

Kings/Chronicles · Differences

How could this happen to us?
 This happened because of our faithlessness.





Chronicles, however ...

- Answers different questions ...
 - Chronicles

Kings/Chronicles · Differences

 Are we still God's people?
 Yes. In spite of your failures, you are still God's. Does God still care about us?
 Yes. In spite of your sins, God still cares. Does God's promises/covenant still apply to us.
 Yes, God remains faithful. • How do God's promises/covenant apply now? • God's faithful -> God's plan.





Chronicles, answers these questions by emphasizing ...

- Unity "all Israel," not just Judah
- Genealogy God's plan from creation to this point (cf. Luke 3)
- The good kings
 David/Solomon
- The temple the divinely ordained building and purpose
- The difference
 - Between national and cumulative sin and its consequences ... Individual responsibility and immediate awareness of God's judgment

Kings/Chronicles · Differences
